


scrumptious meals provided for by staff, complete with festive china — as popular as ever. Naturally, there were leftovers, which proved to be an added bonus for those happy to take them home.

The show featured acrobats, jugglers, trapeze artists, contortionists, and aerial stunts.


The show was fantastic and the group marveled at the costumes and performance.
